Learning new skills is one of the best ways to make you both marketable and happy, but... Read moreNo other word game or puzzle asks quite as much of your brain as a crossword puzzle. Experienced puzzle-biters consider not only the literal meaning of each clue, but also similar ones they've seen before, often repeated answers, syntax peculiarities, puns, cultural references—and, of course, the puzzle theme. Unfortunately, this means that crossword puzzles can be downright unwelcoming to newcomers. Everyone starts somewhere, and no matter what your ability looks like now, here are four general strategies to help you improve. Do Puzzles Every DayThe only way to improve at crossword puzzles is to do lots of them, and the best way to do that is to work them into your daily routine. For me, that means tackling some puzzles from an old book of 365 Will Shortz crossword puzzles before bed every night. My mom prints the Washington Post crossword puzzles and chips away at them over breakfast; my friends who commute by bus or train are diehard New York Times crossword app fans. The New York Times puzzle is most people's crossword gateway drug for a reason: they are easy to find and have a built-in difficulty grading. Mondays are the easiest, Saturdays are the hardest, and puzzles in between ramp up day by day, so you can pick and choose the ones that work for you. That said, the New York Times is far from the only publisher out there. The Washington Post, Los Angeles Times and Merriam-Webster also publish daily American-style crosswords; if cryptic crossword puzzles are your jam, try The Guardian. Some organizations, like Queer Crosswords and Puzzles for Progress, will even send you original themed puzzles as a reward for nonprofit donations. Just remember that each publication has its own style-mastering the tricky clue phrasing in a Saturday New York Times puzzle won't necessarily translate into one from the Post, and vice versa. Use an AppIf you really want to up your crossword game, subscribing to an app, like this one from the New York Times, is a good idea. As much as I love them, paper puzzles just can't touch the user-friendly features you get with an app. You can easily check your work or reveal reply letter by letter, rather than accidentally peek at the whole solution. This demystifies clues just enough to make them feasible, which is exactly what you want. In addition, most apps make your work time, making it easy to measure your progress. But really, the biggest advantage is accessibility: carrying around thousands of digital puzzles in your pocket makes it easy to do a lot of puzzles. Know How-to CheatCheating is a sensitive topic among crossword enthusiasts, enthusiasts, there is no denying that it has its place. Crossword puzzles should be fun, and repeatedly banging my head against the same wall, praying for another result, is not my idea of fun. Moreover, frustration is a lousy teacher. Unless you have serious competitive puzzle ambitions, stubbornly refusing to look up answers or check your work will get you nowhere. A lot of games require a great time investment—at least, if you want the best gear, the... Read moreIntent, you should solve every hint you possibly can without help, but you can not improve without a challenge. A little strategic cheating can guide you through even the toughest puzzles. Apps make this super simple: just check or reveal letters one at a time until you can solve a particularly nasty clue. This gives you just enough information to (mostly) hack it on your own, which in turn makes the answer more likely to stick in your memory. Paper puzzles make strategic cheats a little tougher, but thanks to the Internet, not by much. If you're stuck on a print crossword puzzle, Google the whole hint in quotes. Framing your search around the clue rather than, say, how many letters you need to work with will help you understand what the clue wanted from you. Over time, you will find yourself needing less and less help solving puzzles that previously would have been real stumpers. Study UpIf you are serious about crossword mastery, the Internet is full of like-minded people who would love to help. A blog like Rex Parker's is a great place to start. He solves the New York Times puzzles every day, compares the difficulty with other puzzles from that day of the week, and breaks down key clue/answer pairs in a short post. Between the posts and comments, you'll get a more complete picture of the solution than if you'd just looked up the responses. You can also specialize even longer and brush up on your crossword words that appear frequently in crossword puzzles but almost never in conversation. The New York Times has a quiz that tests your crossword knowledge, and there's a more general guide from Dictionary.com. Perhaps predictably, there is also an entire website devoted to crossword puzzles, with a new word with every day and an extensive archive. If a statistical method is more your speed, there are crossword answer databases out there. Computer scientist Noah Vellman analyzed a set of New York Times crossword clues and answers from 1996-2012, then arranged them with crossword puzzles and how often they appeared. You can filter the lists by the minimum number of appearances or word length, and see details of a given answer. In the same Xwordinfo.com you show yourself the most popular answers and clues for the Times puzzle of year or word length. Hell, you could really go all-out and code yourself some exercise programs like this guy did, but it's unclear if his approach is more effective than just doing a whole bunch of crossword puzzles. This is not to say that you have to build a robot or memorize clues for solve crossword crossword puzzles effectively, the best training strategy is the one that makes you happy. It doesn't matter how many puzzles you solve, or how quickly you can solve them—just that you keep on it. If you can do that, you will never stop improving. This popular cookie shows off a lot in crossword answers. You will also see it in longer answers like Oreo thins. Look for clues that refer to a diet version of the cookie, like lo-cal or calorie-conscious. Clues like twistable treat or any variation that refers to the cookie's crème filling, black-and-white quality, or dip-ability in milk. Check out these 47 brain games that will increase your brain power. Nicole Fornabaior.comThis noun has several definitions, beyond the obvious. It's a surface unit, but it's also a field of study. In that sense, crossword clues can skew in different directions to stretch your mind. You'll see area clued in simple ways like space, zone or land action, but prepare to think out of the box as well. It can be clued as strength (as in a specialty) or kingdom (a nice way to enter an area). Nicole Fornabaior.comErie is a Pennsylvania port city and also a Great Lake. It is also eerie, like the hidden ghost in this puzzle. You'll find clues that refer to its location or refer to a canal, river, lake, or area. Be in search of puns about the Great Lakes as one of a great quintet. The capital G will let you know that you are looking for a proper noun. Try these other 15 tricky word puzzles that are hard to solve. Nicole Fornabaior.comThis nautical term is the opposite of aweather or wind mode, usually on a ship. The lee side is sheltered and away from the storm. You'll see clues for this word referencing everything nautical and weather-focused. Crossword clues for alec can also refer to protection and protection as on the safe side and away from the storm. Can you discover which plane doesn't belong in this puzzle?
